


# NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR

Don't be fooled into thinking *Grease* is just some silly spoof of the 1950's, a lightweight excuse to play some fun music. *Grease* originally took its inspiration from the rock musical *Hair* and other alternative theatre pieces, and in its original form, *Grease* was raunchy, loud and vulgar, a change in direction to mainstream Broadway aesthetics. More than anything else, *Grease* was authentic. It understood the raw, untrained sound of early rock and roll, and the special energy of rebellious teenage kids. *Grease* was no cotton-candy musical comedy. It was smart, sly, insightful social commentary about one of America's defining moments, a moment when our country moved from the repressed 1950s into the adventurous 1960s, a moment when rock and roll – the first art form made exclusively for teenagers – was giving birth to the revolution. *Grease* isn't just a story about young love, and its main characters are not really a teenage boy and girl...The main character in this show is rock and roll

Because they lived it, the creators of *Grease* understood that wild, thrilling, disorienting moment in our cultural history, that brief window in the mid-20th century when death and despair were not hanging over America's collective head, after the wake of the Depression, two World Wars, and the Korean War – and before Vietnam, race riots, Watergate, and the energy crisis. This was a very special, very rich time in America that created some of the most influential culture in the history of the world.

Ever since we announced we were producing Grease at Barlow, I was blown away by the response from our student body, parents, staff and community. I often tell the cast that, "It's not every year you get to produce Grease!" My very first experience with the musical was in middle school when our choir performed a choreographed version of the iconic song, "Summer Nights." As awkward as I was on stage for the first time, I loved every minute of it. I quickly grew to love the movie musical like so many others. When my wife Amber approached me last spring about producing Grease. I went back and listened to the music and agreed that it was the perfect musical to showcase the incredible talent that we have here at Barlow. If you would have told me that we would go from 21 students auditioning for our musical two years ago to almost seventy for this show, I never would have believed we could have grown so much in such a short time! Nevertheless, every person on this cast put in hours of blood, sweat and even tears to earn their way onto this stage. This amazing group is a mixture of experience that range from freshmen to senior, theatrical debut to final high school musical. We have all been through a lot the past few years, and these students get more professional and eager to reach higher heights each year. I am so incredibly proud of the work they have done on this show. I would be remiss if I didn't thank my incomprable collaborators: My lovely wife, Amber Schroeder, Cami Curtis, Linda Zirk, Paul Nickolas, Emily Horton, and my dad, John Schroeder. I couldn not have made this all happen by myself, and I am so lucky to have the best creative team on the planet to work with. Also I want to give a shout out to my kids, Andrew, Camden and Bella for sacraficing time with Mommy and Daddy so we can prepare this department for your arrival. Love you guys!


