



Lost in Yonkers was first presented by Emanuel Azenberg at The Center for the Performing Arts in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, on December 31, 1990. This production subsequently moved to Broadway, opening at the Richard Rogers Theater in New York.

Written by America's great comic playwright, this memory play is set in Yonkers in 1942. The hit Broadway production featured Irene Worth, Mercedes Ruehl, and Kevin Spacey in award-winning performances.


John Schroeder

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR

Marvin Neil Simon, who generally publishes as Neil Simon, first published *Lost in Yonkers* in the United States in 1991. The play, like many of Simon's plays, draws on his experiences growing up in New York City, although many critics think it is not as autobiographical as his other plays. *Lost in Yonkers* was also a critical and popular success and led to a film adaptation in 1993. Although many of Simon's plays had won major dramatic awards before this, *Lost in Yonkers* was the first Simon play to win the Pulitzer Prize for Drama. Many critics consider the play to be Simon's best work and the pinnacle of his career.

The play was very timely. Although it is set during World War II—a setting that plays an important part in the narrative—Simon published the play as America was entering the Gulf War in the Middle East. As a result, the play's main themes—including survival, the importance of one's family, and acceptance—also seem timely, since these themes inevitably arise during war. Everybody in the play is trying hard to survive, each in his or her own way. Despite the problems caused by the Kurnitz family dysfunctionality, the play still reinforces the idea that everybody needs the love of family to survive. Despite each character's attempt to survive, each of them also comes to a point in the play where they have to accept something that they do not want to.

I first saw this play in a high school production when I was a 15 and it instantly grew to become one of my all time favorites. The beautiful melding of comedic wit and deep emotional scenes makes this script relevant to the ups and downs of everyday family life. Regardless of time period, we can all relate to these relationships. Although the play is technically labeled a comedy, it is in fact a hybrid. Simon's exploration of deep pain and humorous dialogue helps the play to strike a perfect balance between tragedy and comedy.

We are very excited to share this story with you and have been working hard through all of the school cancellations and snow days to bring justice to this incredible play. It is a fine cast of student actors and I have enjoyed laughing with and challenging them during this process. We hope you enjoy the show as much as we do!
